And the House having met,

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then entered the House and, being seated on the Throne, was pleased to open the Session by the following gracious speech:—

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I extend my warmest greetings to you on this occasion of the opening of the Third Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of Ontario. On behalf of our Sovereign I convey best wishes to the Premier and to my Ministers and to all Honourable Members.

The people of Ontario and Honourable Members of this Assembly share the honour and pleasure afforded them by the Gracious presence of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, and His Royal Highness, Prince Philip, on the occasion of their visit to Canada this summer. This Royal visit will provide her Majesty's loyal subjects the opportunity to accord a warm welcome to their Queen and to His Royal Highness.

Honourable Members, the Province's economy has been strengthened considerably in the past year and has enjoyed the fastest growth rate in the level of employment in over a decade. My Government expects this trend to continue in 1973 with an increase in real growth of goods and services of 6.0 per cent this year, compared with an estimated 5.5 per cent gain in 1972.

Despite the continued rapid growth of the labour force, the average unemployment rate has declined from 5.2 per cent in 1971 to 4.8 per cent in 1972, and a record 140,000 new jobs were created. This achievement compared favourably with Canada as a whole, where the unemployment rate last year remained virtually unchanged at 6.3 per cent. A moderation in the labour force growth in 1973 combined with the continuing expansion in job opportunities should further improve the Ontario employment picture. Indeed, on a seasonal basis, unemployment in Ontario was 4.1 per cent in February of this year compared with 4.6 per cent in February 1972.

Ontario's fiscal policy in the past two years has played an important part in alleviating unemployment including such measures as personal income tax reductions and selective expenditure increases made by the Province which have had a favourable influence on subsequent federal policy.

In its continuing activities in the development of medium and long-term provincial economic objectives, it is my Government's intention to use the resources of the Joint Committee on Economic Policy to study and recommend policies for Provincial implementation and to develop positions concerning economic and industrial policy coordination between the Province and the Government of Canada.

My Government proposes to strengthen the Ontario Economic Council to support its independent studies of the Ontario economy.

All are aware of the rapidly increasing rate of change around us. The steadily increasing and more concentrated population and the resulting pressure on land create a wide range of new policy imperatives.

It is clear that the preservation of our physical resources is one of the most urgent requirements facing all governments today. The most important of these resources is land. My Government will place before you proposals for major new programs designed to ensure sound planning and to preserve this resource for the use and advantage of future generations.

Two major studies undertaken by the Government have now been received and action will be taken with respect to their implementation.

My Government will introduce legislation which will ensure the preservation of the Niagara Escarpment. Such proposals will be balanced to permit mixed

uses compatible with the preservation of the ecological and historic features of this physical landform which is a unique feature of our Province.

In this connection my Government will establish a Niagara Escarpment Commission to be responsible for the overall planning of physical resources and to ensure that Government policy to preserve the Escarpment is carried out. The total area subject to planning and control in the public interest will be in excess of one million acres.

My Government is prepared to proceed with plans for a Parkway Belt System from Dundas in the West to Oshawa in the East. This Parkway Belt will provide for the orderly channeling of services and utilities that are the essential support systems of urban Southern Ontario, while affording opportunities for the preservation of open space, and providing for the separation of individual urban communities.

One of the primary purposes of the reorganization of local government structures is to encourage more effective planning at the local level, particularly in regard to the control and use of land. My Government believes it essential that the public be increasingly involved in this process. In this regard my Government intends to initiate a major review of The Planning Act and other legislation related to land development.

My Ministry has received proposals regarding regional government both East and West of Metropolitan Toronto and will introduce legislation in this regard.

My Government believes that a strong and reformed local government is in the best position to determine its own priorities, and proposes to transfer to strengthened local governments more authority and responsibility for many of the decisions that relate to local matters.

My Government will take steps to ensure proper policy coordination of initiatives involving land use controls where agricultural lands are concerned so that good farm land may be retained for agricultural purposes.

My Government will introduce legislation to implement recommendations contained in the Interim Report of the Select Committee on Land Drainage.

As a result of its review of the Report of the Select Committee on the Ontario Municipal Board, my Government will place before you proposals to make the Board a more effective vehicle for discharging its responsibilities.

My Government will continue to work for the fullest cooperation with the Federal Government and other provincial governments and looks forward to a number of joint meetings in the coming months. Among them will be the conference of Welfare Ministers next month which, it is hoped, will provide for the development of an integrated approach to income security programs. The Province is well aware of the implications for our municipalities of many of these policy negotiations and will continue to encourage active municipal representation and participation in Provincial negotiations with the Federal Government.

New policy initiatives in the energy field are a matter of active and intensive consideration.

In its concern about changes taking place in the field of energy, Ontario fully recognizes that actions taken now and in the near future by governments both in Canada and abroad will have a profound impact on the supply and cost of energy and, in turn, on the very foundation of our economic progress. The Province is equally aware of the need to place questions on energy in a balanced social perspective to protect the environment as well as the economic interests of the citizens of this Province. New policy initiatives establishing agencies for energy may be expected as well as changes in the role and place of the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario. These proposals will be based on the reports of the Advisory Committee on Energy and Task Force Hydro.

My Government has already acted in relation to specific matters involving potential and significant environmental considerations, such as the Solandt Commission on the proposed Nanticoke-Pickering hydro line and the Task Force to study the potential of the lignite fuel deposits in Northern Ontario.

In the knowledge that similar matters will arise in future which will require intensive and expert study and analysis, my Government will place before you legislation to establish a permanent agency for environmental protection, having the responsibility for a comprehensive system of assessment and evaluation of the environmental significance of activities of ministries of the Government, utilities, projects funded in part by the Government and related activities in the private sector which have comparable environmental implications.

On receiving the recommendations of the Task Force of the Ministry of the Environment, my Government will introduce legislation on the disposal of solid waste.

With respect to the program initiated last year to remove abandoned automobiles from the landscape, new regulations will be introduced providing simplified and more rapid procedures for divesting the title in derelict vehicles to hasten their removal. Other controls will be introduced with regard to locations where these vehicles are collected.

Measures to control the sale of pesticides and also their use by farmers and foresters are being effectively enforced with the cooperation of vendors and users. Further steps will be taken to strengthen these controls.

It is also the intention of my Government to institute a noise abatement program in cooperation with the municipalities.

The objectives of my Government with respect to environmental matters can only be effectively achieved with the cooperation of the people of Ontario, neighbouring provinces and states, and other nations. Therefore, my Ministers attach particular significance to the fact that the Province of Ontario is to be host to a conference sponsored by the Canadian Council of Resource and Environment Ministers this November.

You will be asked to approve a program designed to increase my Government's activity in forest management. This expanded program includes the

regeneration of cut-over lands, establishing new forests on private land, improving growth conditions in existing forests and preparing idle land for planting or seeding. These measures are designed to help meet Ontario's long-term requirements from its forest resources.

Honourable Members, various development policy initiatives and programs will be reviewed by you including new guidelines for financial assistance to the tourist industry, further support for exports, and industrial development with special emphasis on assistance to small business. An expanded program has been prepared to promote all-season facilities in Northern Ontario and throughout the Province.

In view of the accelerated economic growth expected to take place in the United Kingdom because of that country's recent entry into the European Economic Community, the Premier, the Honourable William Davis, has arranged to lead a special mission of manufacturers and businessmen to visit Britain in May to fully explore the range of new opportunities for increasing exports and investments from Ontario to the British market.

To serve the special needs of communities in Northern Ontario, amendments will be introduced to The Airports Act, designed to improve existing aviation facilities in that part of our Province. My Government will propose to contribute up to 80 per cent of total construction costs for these new airport facilities.

In addition my Government will continue to assume full responsibility for the construction and operation of airport facilities servicing unincorporated Northern settlements, including plans for three new airstrips at Indian settlements at Round Lake, Fort Hope and Pikangikum, and a new runway for the airport at Moosonee.

My Government is also proceeding with plans for the development of a new intermediate capacity transit system to help meet the transportation needs of our larger cities, and is evaluating proposals from two manufacturers of intermediate capacity systems. One of these systems is to be installed as a demonstration project at Exhibition Park in Toronto for operational testing purposes.

As Honourable Members are aware, the Camp Commission on the Legislature is presently studying the procedures and processes of our legislative activities and is giving consideration to certain reforms with respect to party finances and election expenditures. The reports from your Commission will be presented for your consideration and resolution during this present Session.

My Government will ask you to approve the appointment of an independent Commission to redistribute the electoral districts of the Province, and redefine their boundaries.

My Government will propose measures relating to conflict of interest with respect to its civil servants.

My Government will provide increased assistance and encouragement to our amateur athletes through special community-wide athletic and recreational programs, and will be giving full support to the first Ontario Summer Games which will be held in Oshawa this summer.

Following my Government's study of the recommendations of the Symons Commission on French Language Secondary Education, a bill will be put before you to create a Languages of Instruction Commission for Ontario's education system.

Plans for immediate implementation involve expanded services to the Franco-Ontarian community by the addition of more French-speaking staff in the central and regional offices of the Ministry of Education.

My Government will provide increased assistance to the native people of our Province through support for cultural development projects, communication services, and the local management of resources. More teachers will be provided who are fluent in the languages of native peoples, and better teaching materials will be made available in those languages.

To help promote greater understanding of the rich cultural heritage of Ontario's native people, new courses will be designed for the Ontario curriculum, especially for elementary students.

To conserve and maintain Ontario's heritage and history, my Government will propose legislation and make funds available for the restoration and maintenance of selected buildings and structures of historic significance. Local public libraries and existing museums will be given increased financial support.

The report of the Rohmer Commission on Book Publishing has been made available to Honourable Members of this House. A number of recommendations have already been implemented by my Government and proposals will be submitted to you in relation to the further implementation of the Commission's final report.

My Government will present legislation with respect to negotiations between the teaching profession and school boards.

My Government has published a position paper inviting public reaction with regard to future policies and programs for the mentally retarded, with particular reference to community as opposed to institutional living. My Ministers are confident that the response of interested organizations and the general public will be helpful in determining future programs. In the interim, present care systems for our retarded and handicapped will continue to receive direct government support, including additional capital funding for day-care nurseries for retarded children and for experimental projects in new specialized centres for the seriously retarded.

A third regional centre for the hearing handicapped will be opened in London this fall and will provide residential and day-care programs for 250 deaf and hard-of-hearing students. This new facility will serve as a resource centre for Southwestern Ontario so that more children may receive improved educational programs in their own communities.

My Government is appreciative of the cooperation of the Ontario Council of Health Advisory Group on Medical Care Insurance for undertaking a com-

prehensive review of the health insurance plan. My Ministers are determined to maintain the highest standard of medical and hospital care for all our people throughout Ontario and to deliver these services at a reasonable cost.

Advice has been sought from the Ontario Council of Health on the question of Community Health Centres which when considered with the current activities of the special committee on the future delivery of health services will provide a strong blueprint for future policy in these important areas.

My Government will proceed with proposals for a Health Disciplines Act which were tabled in the previous Session and will introduce legislation during this Session to establish a Health Disciplines Board.

Further legislation will be presented to you to strengthen the position and clarify the role of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario.

My Government proposes to increase assistance to family service agencies, and, in addition, to establish a special counselling and welcoming centre for newcomers to our Province, which will serve as a means to familiarize them with Government services and benefits available to them.

My Government will propose adjustments in the benefits provided under The Workmen's Compensation Act in order to maintain an appropriate level of support reflecting increases in the cost of living and recent adjustments to Provincial wage rates.

My Government will continue its substantial commitment in the field of housing and land development for low and moderate income wage earners. Housing programs will be restructured during the year in light of new amendments to The National Housing Act and recommendations of the Ontario Task Force on Housing Policy. My Government has recently initiated an Integrated Community Housing Program for which Ontario provides development funds at preferred interest rates for the construction of private housing. In return, builders set aside up to 26 per cent of this housing for families requiring assistance.

In the area of consumer and commercial relations, my Government regards as essential a coordinated approach to the development of provincial and federal policies. The Government of Canada has been informed of Ontario's concerns regarding the development of a national competition policy, with the hope that through such consultation more effective legislation may be achieved.

A livestock Medicines Act will be introduced to control and regulate the use of drugs available for agricultural livestock purposes.

My Government plans to reintroduce The Consumer Reporting Act and The Cooperative Corporations Act, both of which have important implications with regard to credit and loan practices throughout Ontario.

Ontario will press for a greater degree of cooperation and coordination with the Federal Government with respect to the administration of justice.

In one area of special concern, the introduction of intermittent sentencing, while essentially a commendable principle, has resulted in a conflict with the well developed temporary absence program of the provincial Ministry of Correctional Services. This has also placed certain difficulties before our judges, and it is most important that clarification of the application of these principles be achieved.

To increase the availability of trained personnel in the corrections field, arrangements have been made with selected community colleges for experimental 'Correctional Worker' courses, using corrections staff to give advice on the curriculum, and offering field training in correctional settings.

My Government will also implement certain recommendations of the Botterell Report to improve health care services for wards and inmates of correctional institutions. The group home program for juveniles will be expanded.

My Government proposes to improve the efficiency of the courts of law. Following studies by the Law Reform Commission and other agencies, plans will be introduced designed to provide a systems concept based on modern management methods. These measures will require a review of our tiered system of justice, the rules of procedure governing the operation of the courts, and new ways of dealing with certain infractions which are handled as criminal offences but which, as is widely agreed, should not be so treated.

Furthermore, my Government will introduce proposals for a system of Crown Legal Clerks to prosecute minor offences under the direction of the Crown Attorney and relieve the police constable of this task.

Amendments will be proposed to The Jurors Act to remove disqualification of people in many occupations and trades and allow greater citizen participation in the jury process. The Grand Jury, as an element in the criminal trial process, will be abolished, and its present function relating to the inspection of public institutions will be retained and performed by a Public Review Committee.

My Government will establish a training program for Justices of the Peace who preside in Provincial Courts, and The Justices of the Peace Act will be amended to clarify their role in relation to that of provincial court judges.

My Government will continue to seek the cooperation of the Federal Government to permit the Province to introduce an off-track betting service.

My Ministry holds the view that support for our law enforcement services must be strengthened. To this end, improved police training facilities, an upgraded communications and information network, and the comprehensive review of policing in Ontario, currently being conducted by a Task Force, are all essential elements of an overall response to growing concerns and expectations with regard to public protection.

To help combat drug-related crimes and the illegal use of drugs, the Ontario Provincial Police will establish a special drug law enforcement program

to be undertaken jointly with municipal forces and the RCMP. The program will place emphasis on controlling the trafficking of hard drugs.

As a result of extensive investigations by our law enforcement agencies, and upon the advice of the appropriate Ministry, my Government will establish a Royal Commission to enquire into the possibility of criminal activities within the plastering, lathing and dry-walling sectors of the building industry in Metropolitan Toronto.

These and other matters will be placed before you for your consideration.

May Divine Providence guide you in your several tasks and in the discharge of your serious responsibilities.

God bless the Queen and Canada.

And the Bill was accordingly read the second time and referred to the Committee of the Whole House.

Yesterday, the Member for Ottawa East presented what purported to be a Petition to the House, signed by himself and the Member for Huron, at which time I advised him that, in my opinion, his Petition was not proper, in that it was not a Public Petition. However, I agreed to take the matter under consideration.

Petitions to Parliament were formerly of two types—1. Petitions for or against Private Bills. 2. Public Petitions for the purpose of asking a redress of grievances, or praying that Parliament take some certain action in respect to some matter of public policy, etc. The first type, that is those for or against Private Bills, have been eliminated in this House by the new Standing Orders, leaving only Public Petitions. Lewis, at page 46, states the following:—"The number of Public Petitions presented to the Ontario House during recent years has not been very great but such a process still remains the only way in which a member of the public outside the House can communicate his requests to the Legislative body which governs the Province". From this it will be seen that, in this House at least, Petitions are the method for the public, as distinct from the Members, to bring matters before the House. I note with some interest that the British practice is slightly different. There, a Member may Petition the House to which he belongs, but, if he does, his Petition must be presented by another Member, not by himself. However, I can find no precedent for even this practice in the Ontario House.

In any event, the Member's Petition is faulty in form. A Petition to the House is, as indicated in the quotation from Lewis, already cited, for the redress of a grievance *by the House*. It seeks action by the House, not by a Minister. The Petition presented by the Honourable Member, while properly addressed, asked the Minister of Education to take action, not the House. Such a Petition should be addressed to and sent to the Minister concerned.

I feel that I should avail myself of this opportunity to point out to the House that the correct procedure, as established in this and other jurisdictions, is that when a Public Petition is to be presented to the House, it is filed with the Clerk's Office in advance, so that it may be scanned to ensure that it does not offend any of the Standing Orders or precedents. When the Petition is in proper form and within the rules of the House, the Speaker is then advised in advance by the Clerk's Office that a Petition will be presented on that day.

Before the Orders of the Day, the Member for Renfrew-South (Mr. Yakabuski) refused to resume his seat when directed to do so by Mr. Speaker. Accordingly, Mr. Speaker directed the member to withdraw from the service of the House for the balance of this day's sitting.

Mr. Speaker delivered the following ruling:—

After the debate on the adjournment last night I informed the House that I would give further study to the provisions of Standing Orders 27 (g) and 28, in an effort to clear up what seemed to me to be some ambiguity.

The provisions of these two Orders were taken almost word for word from Standing Order 39, subsection 6, and Standing Order 40 of the House of Commons of Canada. Standing Order 40 provides that the Member raising the matter may speak for not more than seven minutes, and the Minister of the Crown, or a Parliamentary Secretary speaking on behalf of the Minister, if he wishes to do so, may speak for not more than three minutes. It, therefore, appears clear to me that the pluralizing of the word "Members" in the eighth line of our Standing Order 28 (a) resulted from a typographical error. In any event the Standing Order clearly provides that no one matter may be debated for more than ten minutes, 5 minutes to the Members raising the matter, and 5 minutes to the Minister. Therefore, even should the plural be allowed, the 5 minutes would of necessity be divided between the Members raising the matter. However, it seems much more logical to recognize the fact that the word "Members" is a misprint and to interpret it in the singular, and I so rule. 28 (a) also provides that, where there are several such matters, the total time allotted to the debate on all is thirty minutes, the Speaker terminating the debates at the end of that period by adjourning the House.

As the Federal House of Commons has had this procedure in their rules for many years, I thought the House might be interested in its application there. On each subject matter the Member who raised it, that is who was dissatisfied with the answer he received in the Question Period, or with the Speaker's ruling that it was not urgent, speaks to it for not more than 7 minutes. A Minister or Parliamentary Secretary may reply for not more than 3 minutes, if he so wishes, the total debate on each subject matter being, as in this House, not more than 10 minutes. At the end of 30 minutes, or when the debates on all the subject matters have been completed, whichever comes first, the Speaker declares the House adjourned until the next sitting day. Two points of their practice are of considerable interest—1. No Points of Order, or any discussion other than the two speeches provided for by the Standing Order are permitted during the adjournment debate. 2. No concern is given to the matter of a quorum. As the debate is technically on a motion to adjourn, a quorum call would simply result in the premature termination of the debate and the House would adjourn. I am told that very often by the time the last matter is being discussed the attendance in the House consists of two, the Member raising the matter and the Minister or Parliamentary Secretary.

Yesterday, the question was raised as to whether a question supplementary to one on which notice had been given under this rule could itself be the subject of a notice for a separate debate. I think it is fair to say that I will deal with such matters as they arise. If I am satisfied that there is a sufficient difference in the point raised by the supplementary question, I will permit a separate debate thereon, but only as the last subject of the adjournment debate, if time permits within the half hour total limitation.

Yesterday, arising out of the discussion relative to the reporting of Estimates by Standing Committees, I agreed to take the matter under consideration.

I have now had an opportunity of studying Standing Order 87 and also of refreshing my memory with respect to its application.

Clause (c) puts a precise time limitation on the proceedings in the Committee of Supply, and clause (k) states clearly that at the termination of that time allotment the Chairman shall put all questions necessary to carry every vote and item *not referred to Standing Committees under clause (e)* and such questions are not debatable. This means, of course, that any Estimates not reached by the Committee in the time allotted must be reported without debate.

Similarly, clause (f) provides that Estimates referred to Standing Committees must be so referred within thirty sessional days from the presentation of the Budget and *must* be reported to the House within seventy-five sessional days from such presentation. It seems very clear that such Estimates must be reported not later than the seventy-fifth day, and moreover clause (k), previously referred to, contemplates that the Committee of Supply report only those Estimates not referred to Standing Committees. I believe it was for this reason that clauses (g) and (h) were inserted, providing for a debate of not more than two and one half hours on concurrence in any set of Estimates reported back from a Standing Committee, the time taken by such debates being included by clause (c) in the time allotment for Committee of Supply.

Since the new Standing Orders were adopted in April of 1970, I have never before heard the suggestion proposed by the Member for Scarborough West yesterday. It seemed to be clearly understood that the Standing Committees to whom Estimates have been referred must, if they wish to discuss all Estimates referred to them, arrange their programmes so as to complete their work within the allotted time. It was my understanding that these time limitations were adopted unanimously so that the study of the Estimates might be completed within what appeared to be a reasonable time, having regard to the experience of former years. If the suggested interpretation were given to the Standing Order it would mean that a Standing Committee could use up the whole time provided under clause (f) on one set of Estimates and then demand the remainder be brought back into the Committee of Supply and the time of that Committee extended accordingly. Such an interpretation could well defeat the whole purpose of providing for Estimates to be considered by Standing Committees.

Before the Orders of the Day, Mr. Speaker delivered the following ruling:—

I have now had an opportunity to read the letter in the Toronto Sun, written by the Deputy Speaker, and to which the Member for Scarborough West referred on Monday, and I have looked into the precedents which apply.

I find the letter in question to be an accurate statement of the voting procedure as it has evolved in Parliament. Firstly, it must be remembered that the Chairman, or the Speaker, as the case may be, is only expressing his *opinion*; he clearly states “in my opinion the Ayes have it”—or as the case may be. His judgment is not final and does not become final until either the House accepts his opinion or calls for a standing vote or division. In expressing his opinion he is entitled to take a number of factors into consideration, including the probabilities of the case. The reason for demanding a standing vote is, that you do not agree with the Chairman's opinion and wish a counted vote, in order to ascertain whether or not his opinion is in fact correct. Really the only practical reason for the Chairman to call for the Ayes and Nays is that, in at least nine cases out of ten, the Members are prepared to accept the Chairman's opinion and thereby eliminate the necessity for a standing vote. I refer the Members to May's Parliamentary Practice, page 374, and to the Parliamentary Debates of the House of Commons of the United Kingdom (1955-56) 547, c. 602; in that case the Deputy Speaker sitting in Committee of the Whole House had found in favour of the Ayes, even though some Members of

the Opposition expressed the opinion that no voices had sounded on the Ayes side. A division having been called, the Deputy Speaker, while agreeing that the Noes had been louder, stated that he had expressed his opinion from the probability of the case that the Ayes had it and was proving it by having a division.

That, for the purpose of redistribution of Ontario Electoral Districts, a Commission of three shall be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council; one Commissioner to be designated as Chairman.

That, a member of the Commission may be paid such per diem allowance as may be fixed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, and is entitled to reasonable travelling and living expenses incurred by him while absent from his ordinary place of residence in the course of his duties as a member of the Commission; the costs of the Commission to be paid out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

That, the Commission shall employ such staff as it considers necessary and, subject to the approval of the Management Board of Cabinet, may fix the salaries and expenses of such persons.

That, the Commission shall determine the population of Ontario as nearly as may be ascertained, based on the census of population taken by Statistics Canada in the year 1971, and shall determine the number of Electoral Districts into which Ontario is to be divided, which number shall not be less than the present 117 and not more than 125, provided that the total number of Electoral Districts in that part of Ontario lying North and West of the Southern Boundaries of the present Electoral Districts of Algoma-Manitoulin, Sudbury East and Nipissing shall not be less than 15, but nothing in this paragraph shall preclude the Commission from establishing boundaries of Electoral Districts that extend across or beyond Southern Boundaries of the present Electoral Districts mentioned.

That, for the purpose of the distribution the Commission shall take into account (a) community or diversity of interests; (b) means of communication; (c) topographical features; (d) population trends; (e) the varying conditions and requirements regarding representation as between urban and rural Electoral Districts; (f) existing boundaries of municipalities or wards thereof; (g) the existing and traditional boundaries of Electoral Districts and (h) special geographic considerations, including in particular the sparsity, density or relative rate of growth of population in the various regions of the Province, the accessibility of such regions or the size or shape thereof; and subject thereto the population quota for each Electoral District shall be based on the average population, but in determining such quota the Commission shall not depart from the average population to a greater extent than 25% more or less, except where in the opinion of the Commission any of the above circumstances exist to such an extent that require a greater departure, in which case the Commission may depart from the average population to such greater extent as it considers necessary or desirable.

*Lieutenant Governor's recommendation received.

That, the Commission, before reporting, shall prepare a map with a description of the boundaries of each proposed Electoral District or group of Electoral Districts, and shall invite public attention to the map by publishing a notice in THE ONTARIO GAZETTE, and may publish the map or parts thereof in newspapers having general circulation in the proposed Electoral Districts; the notice in THE ONTARIO GAZETTE shall provide for the lodging of objections and suggestions in writing with the Commission before such date as the notice shall provide.

I must draw the attention of the House to the fact that Standing Order 87 is the one dealing with the Supply procedure. It provides for the consideration of some Estimates by the Committee of Supply and of others by Standing Committees to which they have been referred. By clauses (g) and (h) it provides for debates on the reports of Standing Committees, and by clause (i) for debates on not more than three Want of Confidence motions. I repeat, this whole Standing Order 87 deals with the supply procedure in the Committees and in the House, and as the procedure under that Standing Order has been completed for this Session, the notice cannot now be accepted and I have directed that it not be placed on the Notice Paper.

I should point out that the procedure is similar both in the House of Commons of Canada and the House of Commons of the United Kingdom, where such motions are included in the days allotted to the consideration of Supply. I refer the Members to May's Parliamentary Practice, 18th Edition, page 279.

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor of the Province entered the Chamber of the Legislative Assembly and took his seat upon the Throne.

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to deliver the following gracious speech:—

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

At the close of the Third Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of Ontario, it is my pleasant task to review some of the accomplishments of this Assembly over the past year.

As Honourable Members are aware, it has been a year in which the Province's economy has been subjected to strong pressures from internal, national and international influences. Nevertheless, Ontario was able to demonstrate an overall increase in real growth of 7.2% in 1973 compared with 6% in 1972, and the unemployment average for 1973 declined to a little over 4% from 4.8% the year before.

The Government has continued to encourage and participate in consultations with municipalities, other Provinces and the Federal Government with useful and largely satisfying results. At several Federal-Provincial meetings, including the meeting of First Ministers last May, the Province has been consistent in its appeal for a comprehensive and coherent plan of fiscal reform.

It is Ontario's view that a reallocation of tax revenues is fundamental, given the distribution of responsibilities among the three major levels of government in Canada.

Significant progress has been made in plans for the reform of local government structures. Legislation for four new two-tier regional municipalities East and West of Metropolitan Toronto and for the regional municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk was the culmination of a restructuring of Ontario's communities on a broader base to enhance their viability and provide a stronger framework for the future.

As stated in the Throne Speech last March, the Government regards the development and implementation of land use policies as an integral part of these reform measures. The new Ontario Planning and Development Act makes provision for just such development planning in continuing consultation with local governments and with scope for regular reviews of development proposals through public hearings and other representations.

My Government is firmly convinced that by pursuing a decentralized administrative system, and by placing the means for development of Ontario's communities more and more in the hands of local governments, it is helping to ensure the preservation of the qualities that are important in the lives of their residents.

In the Budget last spring, grants to municipalities were increased by the unprecedented amount of \$400 million, to \$2.4 billion. The total amount is equivalent to 90% of the Province's total revenues from the Provincial sales tax and personal income tax. These steps have been effective in reducing upward pressures on property taxes across Ontario and in generally strengthening our municipalities.

The unique needs of Northern Ontario are recognized in a special new grant equivalent to an additional 10% of municipal levies that will have brought an estimated \$8.6 million in extra support to our Northern municipalities during this past year. This assistance is in addition to an increased General Support Grant of 4% of municipal levies for all municipalities throughout the Province.

In further measures to prevent large increases in property taxes, the Government of Ontario increased its share of total elementary and secondary school costs by \$92 million over 1972. The Province now, therefore, pays 60% of overall costs of elementary and secondary education. In a period of uncertain post-secondary enrolments, introduction of a "slip year" grants formula based on the previous year's actual enrolment is helping our universities plan programs in advance with full assurance of Provincial support.

Another Budget provision is the abolition of succession duties on all family farms that remain within a family and continue to be used for farming. Ontario's Farm Tax Rebate Program now makes farmers virtually exempt from taxes on the land portion of their assessment by increasing rebates from 25% to 50% of the municipal tax bill.

My Government believes it has a responsibility to ensure that the benefits of this and other Provincial farm policies go to genuine farmers only. To this end, a special Advisory Committee was set up in April to examine the issue of farm classification in Ontario. Their work has included a series of public meetings throughout the Province. The committee's recommendations should lead to further positive action that will encourage farming and preserve valuable farm lands, and which will ensure the continuity of viable farm units.

Early last spring, hundreds of residents experienced hardships as a result of exceedingly high water levels, and ice and erosion damage along the shores of the Great Lakes. Ready and substantial assistance by the Province was made available with a \$50 million program enabling municipalities to make direct loans to property owners for repairs to damaged shore property and buildings. Provision was made for the Northern Ontario Development Corporation to offer similar assistance to residents in the unorganized territories.

A new Ontario Business Incentives Program was established in the summer. Performance loans have been replaced by long-term repayable loans, which are being made available to service industries and tourist operators as well as to manufacturers. A newly created Eastern Ontario Development Corporation will focus on the special development needs of that area of the Province and shares the broadened responsibilities that have been given to the Ontario Development Corporation and the Northern Ontario Development Corporation.

In provisions for senior citizens, former supplementary grants were replaced by a \$100 pensioner tax credit, at a cost to the Province of \$40 million per year, or twice the amount allocated in 1972. As announced in the Budget last spring, senior citizens will benefit as well from new property and sales tax credits, and can now claim all three credits through the income tax system.

Revised workmen's compensation benefits were approved by the Legislature last summer, reflecting cost-of-living increases and higher minimum wage rates. These revisions included an increase in the minimum pension for personal total disability from \$175 to \$250 per month, higher minimum benefits for widows and dependants, and higher earning ceilings for compensation eligibility. In addition, the Workmen's Compensation Board itself is making substantial progress in discharging its duties to the public in accordance with the comprehensive Task Force report received in the fall.

In February 1973, Ontario's minimum wage rate was increased to \$1.80 for employees in general industry and to \$2.05 for construction industry employees. Effective January 1st, 1974 the minimum wage was further increased to \$2.00 and \$2.25 respectively to help reduce the effects of cost-of-living increases on the low-income wage earner. Through additional protective legislation, all employees will be entitled to two weeks' paid vacation annually after one year's employment, and to a minimum of four prescribed statutory holidays with pay.

Honourable Members, the programs highlighted in this review represent but a small proportion of the achievements during an exceedingly busy year. In the business of the Legislature during this time more than 175 Bills brought before this Assembly have received Royal Assent. The provisions they contain are a testament to the continued endeavours of my Government toward ensuring the well-being of the residents of this Province.

May I, on behalf of the people of Ontario, commend you on the way in which you have fulfilled your duties in this past Session. In conclusion, I now declare the Session prorogued.

In our Sovereign's name, I thank you.

God bless the Queen and Canada.
